





- Utilizing relief items stocked in storage facilities or items from private companies












- Volunteers and NGOs: just amateurs or "dogooders"?

- Better "strategic" coordination needed



Japan Earthquake and Tsunami: Who What Where as of 06/05/2011 Miyagi Prefecture



Situation Report 20 May 2011



This report is produced by the Japan Platform, in corporation with the Japan NGO Center for International Cooperation (JANIC). It covers the period from 7 to 20 May 2011.

1. Highlights / Key Priorities

- The death toll from the 11 March earthquake/tsunami and aftershocks has exceeded 15,000.
- The Government announced a roadmap for the next three months recovery phase aiming to close the most of evacuation centres by the end of August.
- The Government and TEPCO are likely to review its roadmap that seeks to put the reactors under control within six to nine months due to the larger-than-expected damages inflicted by the disaster.
- Evacuation of residents in a planned evacuation zone outside the 20 km evacuation zone has started on 15 May.

Overview

The death toll from the 11 March earthquake/tsunami and aftershocks in north eastern Japan has exceeded 15,000 on 13 May. The National Police Agency announced that the total number of confirmed dead, including those killed in aftershocks on 7 and 11 April was 15,129 while 9,034 are still missing, as of 19 May. Miyagi Prefecture suffered the largest number of deaths at 9,038, followed by Iwate at 4,454 and Fukushima with 1,573. About 86% of the dead have been identified. The total number of death and missing was 24,163 as of 19 May.
